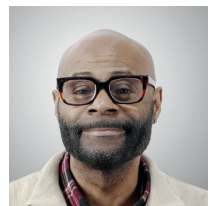

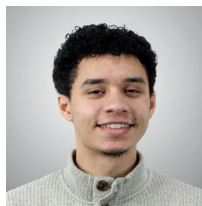

Grading and Condition

Superb	Extraordinary item in the finest condition.
Extremely Fine (XF)	A stamp or cover of outstanding and exceptional quality.
Very Fine (VF)	Scott Catalog's standard. Stamps will present a nice, balanced appearance. Covers appear new or show only minimal wear.
Fine-Very Fine (F-VF)	Stamp and/or covers are sound. Stamps are fully margined but noticeably off-center. Covers show normal travel wear.

These conditions, even if not described, are not grounds for return.

Robert Cobb Kennedy (October 25, 1835 – March 25, 1865) joined the First Louisiana Regulars as a lieutenant at the start of the Civil War. He was captured while carrying dispatches, imprisoned at Johnson's Island, and later escaped and made it to Canada, where he joined a small group of fellow Confederate operatives in a plot to burn New York City in retaliation for General Sheridan's scorched-earth tactics. Each of the conspirators was equipped with incendiary devices, with which they planned to start fires in a number of hotels around the city where they had procured rooms. The plot ultimately failed, with the fires being quickly extinguished because the conspirators didn't open any windows. After the failed attack, Kennedy fled to Canada, returning briefly to American soil to participate in a failed attempt to rescue Confederate prisoners by hijacking the train carrying them and diverting it to Canada. Kennedy then attempted to return to Confederate territory but was apprehended by federal detectives. He was transferred to Fort Lafayette in NYC to stand trial, was found guilty on all charges, and sentenced to hang. His execution on March 25, 1865, marked the last execution of a Confederate soldier by the United States government during the Civil War.

H. 39th Ky who stopped on their way from Louisiana to Catlettsburg (KY) at a school house in Ky. opposite Round Bottom to stay all night, & took 11 of our men prisoners, killed the Lieut, & wounded 3 men and the balance of our men were badly frostbitten on account of being obliged to take to flight without shoes or coats & the Rebels lost 3 men, killed. These Rebels have their own way of it in this County.”) and a handful of others, also includes a telegraph with “Little Miami & Columbus & Xenia Railroad Company Telegraph Department” signed by Brig. Gen. Hooper, 29th Reg Ga Vol, Stevens Brigade, Walkers Division, Dalton, Georgia, was initially marked to be forwarded to the Army of Tennessee Hospital in Griffin, Georgia. But when it was discovered that the addressee had been captured, it was forwarded a second time back to Okolona, MS with ‘for’d 10’ added on the envelope for the forwarding fee. Lt Thomas J. Perry added a lengthy notation on the back of the envelope with the details of the capture, “*Marietta, Ga June 22, 1864 The Lt was captured on the 19th inst out on skirmish. He mistook the enemy for our folks and walked right up to them and did not discover the mistake until it was too late. As soon as they saw him, they motioned him to come to them and professed to be our men...The Lt was well when captured. Thos J. Perry.*” Hooper was taken to Johnson Island. 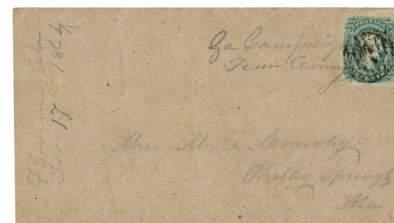
William Henry Gist was born in Charleston and served in both the South Carolina House of Representatives and the South Carolina Senate from 1844 to 1856. Although elected Lieutenant Governor by the state legislature in 1848, he failed to qualify and therefore remained in the Senate. A strong supporter of secession, he was elected as governor in 1858 and wrote to all cotton states except Texas to inform them of the likelihood of South Carolina’s withdrawal from the Union and to request their cooperation. He also kept the state legislature in special session to await the outcome of the 1860 presidential election, proposing that a convention be called and the militia strengthened in the event of Abraham Lincoln’s election. Gist left office on December 17, 1860, the day that the Secession Convention convened, and signed the Ordinance of Secession as a convention member.

On May 4, 1861, two weeks before North Carolina seceded, Zebulon Baird Vance raised a company of local men known as the Rough and Ready Guards and became their captain. He led his troops in various battles and ran for governor while neither campaigning nor leaving the battlefield. He was in the trenches at Petersburg, Virginia when he learned about the outcome of the election. He resigned his commission and traveled to Raleigh to become governor. He was inaugurated on September 8, 1862 at the age of 32. The war over, Vance was arrested in Statesville on May 13, 1865, his 35th birthday, and he was out as governor as Andrew Johnson appointed someone else. After 47 days in jail, he was paroled and later pardoned by Johnson. He went on to serve as governor again (1877-79), then in the Senate (1879-April 14 1894; his date of death). William Lewis Cabel, “Old Tige” graduated from West Point in 1850 and served primarily in the Quartermaster General’s Office until the outbreak of the war, at which time he resigned and was promptly assigned by the CSA as Major and Chief Quartermaster to General Beauregard at Manassas. He later served on the staff of General J. E. Johnston, at which time he assisted these two officers in designing the Confederate battle flag. Transferred to the Trans-Mississippi under General Van Dorn, Cabell was of great service after the Battle of Elkhorn, when he ferried the latter’s entire command to the eastern bank of the Mississippi River. Later, he was appointed brigadier general to rank from January 20, 1863. While in command of a brigade of cavalry under General Sterling Price, he was captured on a raid into Missouri in October 1864 and held prisoner until August 1865.

The James Petigru Boyce (1827-1888) correspondence is known and he docketed many of his covers at the left regarding the sender. Boyce was a chaplain for a Confederate regiment of volunteers from Greenville, a Representative to the S.C. Legislature, and aide-de-camp to the governor of South Carolina. Boyce was founder and first president of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Christoph Gustavus Memminger (1803-1888) was born in Germany. He was a month old when his father died, and his mother immigrated to South Carolina. Sadly, she died of yellow fever when he was 4, and he was placed in the Charleston Orphan House, where, at the age of 11, was adopted by future governor Thomas Bennett. When South Carolina seceded, Memminger wrote the South Carolina Declaration of Secession, was selected as a South Carolina delegate to the Confederate States Provisional Congress, and chaired the committee which drafted the Provisional Constitution of the Confederate States. When Jefferson Davis formed his first cabinet, Memminger was appointed Secretary of the Treasury on February 21, 1861. It was a difficult task in view of the Confederacy's financial challenges. He attempted to finance the government initially by bonds and tariffs, and the confiscation of gold from the United States Mint in New Orleans. Still, he soon found himself forced to extreme measures such as income taxes and fiat currency. With inflation spiraling out of control, he resigned in June 1864. He appears on the Confederate \$5 bill.

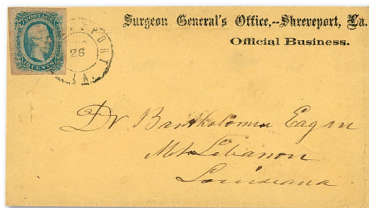
The Confederate Bureau of Conscription was a government agency within the Confederate States of America responsible for implementing conscription laws and overseeing the enrollment of men into military service. It was established under the Adjutant and Inspector General's Department in December 1862. The bureau's primary function was to enroll, exempt, and manage conscripted soldiers. 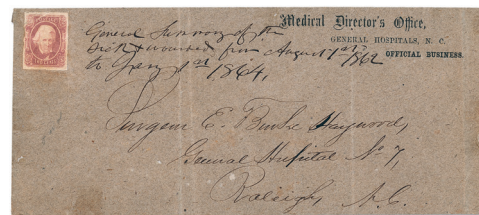

McPhail enrolled in Company A of the 56th Virginia Infantry in July 1861 and was elected Captain of his Company in May 1862; He was promoted to Major of the Regiment on 13 June 1864, and appointed Lieutenant Colonel on 7 December 1864. He was captured in action at Hatcher’s Run, Virginia, on 31 March 1865 and imprisoned at the Old Capitol Prison in Washington DC and at Johnson’s Island before being released on 15 July. After the War, He built and was president of the Richmond and Mecklenburg Railroad. Waddill was a political figure from Georgia, and Stanard was chief engineer for building fortifications for the city of Richmond, obviously using slave laborers he rented from various local slaveowners.

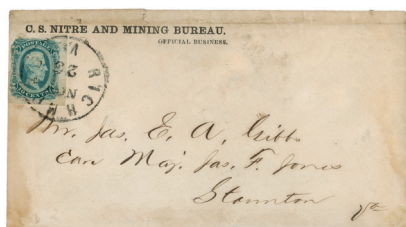

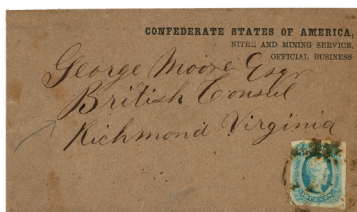

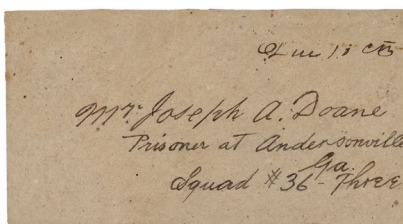
