At the request of E. RIDDLE, Esq., late Commissioner of the United States to the Industrial Exhibition, London, I have the honor to inclose you the accompanying bill of expenses, which have accrued upon your goods. These expenses are the same as those charged upon all foreign contributions to the Exhibition, though in the case of every other nation they were paid by the government. It is hoped that Congress may not be indisposed to make such an appropriation during its present session, as will meet the expenses of the United States commission, for the furtherance of which I beg leave to inclose you a petition, which I beg you will have copied, and, with your own signature and those of your friends and neighbors, transmitted to the member from your district at Washington. As petitions for this appropriation are proceeding from all parts of the country at the present time, I would suggest that yours may be forwarded at the earliest moment. In case of an appropriation being made, the expenses paid by you will be refunded.

The United States goods were shipped from London, on board the "Caroline Read," on the 15th ultimo, and may be expected to arrive here on or about the 20th inst. Begging your instructions in reference to your goods, I have the honor to be,
