Here the Continental Congress drew up and signed the Declaration of Independence "That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent states." In 1787 the Constitutional Convention, attended by the venerable Franklin, framed the governing instrument of our United States, the Constitution. America's most famous landmark, where gathered the most able statesmen and leaders of the day.



BENJAMIN FRANKLIN, First Postmaster General

Founder of the American postal system—scientist, statesman, author, publisher, philosopher and wit, born in Massachusetts of humble parentage. Sent to England as agent of the Provinces. Exerted all his influence in favor of the Declaration of Independence and did much to secure the ratification of the Constitution. Concluded with France the first treaty of the United States with a foreign power. Filled the office of governor of Pennsylvania. Franklin's works include an unfinished Autobiography and a great number of political, anti-slavery, financial, economic and scientific papers. (1706-1790).



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
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
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George Washington, 1st President, 1789-1797

"First in war, first in peace, and first in the hearts of his countrymen", first written of Washington at the time of his death, describes the immortal place he holds in history and in the affections of the American people. Important events of his term as President: Admission of Vermont, Kentucky and Tennessee to the Union; establishment of the First Bank of the United States; and the adoption of the first ten amendments to the Constitution. It was indeed fortunate for the nation that these early years of the new government were under the able leadership of George Washington. (1732-1799)



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MARTHA WASHINGTON

The wife of the first President, Mrs. Washington set the precedent in entertainment in official circles, some of the customs which are observed to this day. While her public receptions were very formal, she preferred to entertain her friends with the simple lavishness of an American hostess, rather than with the brilliancy and display of a foreign court. Accustomed to the busy but peaceful life of the wife of a Southern planter, she bore the change to the gay life of the metropolis serenely. A true helpmate to her husband, courtly and gracious, well suited to fill the position of "First Lady of Our Land".

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

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

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


John Adams, 2nd President, 1797-1801

Actively interested and influential in public affairs—As commissioner to France, and later as the first United States minister to England, Adams' influence was felt beyond American boundaries. Served as vice president under George Washington—One of Adams' last important acts as President was to make a peaceable settlement of difficulties with France. The only President who has ever had the joy of seeing his son elected to the position of President of the United States. It is a coincidence of fate that John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, the only two Presidents who signed the Declaration of Independence, should die on the same day, and that the day should be the anniversary of their act—July fourth. (1735-1826)



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
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Thomas Jefferson, 3rd President, 1801-1809

A leader of democratic ideals and an able public servant—a popular man and a popular President. One of his most important presidential acts, in its effect upon the country, was his purchase from the French of the Louisiana Territory, which at that time doubled the size of the United States. Because of his literary ability, the honor of writing the Declaration of Independence was his. It was a coincidence of fate that Thomas Jefferson and John Adams, the only two Presidents who signed the Declaration of Independence, should die on the same day, and that the day should be the anniversary of their act — July fourth. (1743-1826)

James Madison, 4th President, 1809-1817

Well educated, gracious, the son of a Virginia planter, Madison, a true statesman, earned the title "Father of the Constitution" for his share in drafting the original articles, and for writing the first ten amendments that were adopted. An admirer and friend of Thomas Jefferson, he served as secretary of state during the latter's term of office as President. Elected to the Presidency to succeed Jefferson, a peace-loving man who was reluctant to enter the War of 1812, which eventually established the commercial rights of the United States on the sea. During Madison's eight years in office Louisiana and Indiana were admitted to the Union. (1751-1836)



Dolly Madison

For sixteen years Dolly Madison led Washington society. First, because Thomas Jefferson was a widower during his presidency and there was no "First Lady of the Land", she acted as official hostess, and later in her own rightful position. The White House, the center of the social life of the capitol, assumed an ease, freedom and equality credited to this far-famed and gracious lady. Also, it is told of her, that at the time the British were advancing upon Washington in 1812, she had George Washington's portrait removed from its frame and bore it off with her, lest it be damaged.



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
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

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

James Monroe, 5th President, 1817-1825  
Colonial Soldier during Revolutionary War, later lawyer and politician, held a succession of posts in the Virginia legislature, Continental Congress, Virginia Ratifying Convention, United States Senate, and diplomatic service in France and England. Governor of his state and secretary of war under President Madison. Thoroughly fitted for duties of President when elected. Best known for the "Monroe Doctrine", a policy instituted for general good will between nations. Important accomplishments of Monroe's two terms: pledge of peace between England and the United States in 1817 over Canadian frontier line, annexation of Florida, and the Missouri Compromise. (1758-1831)

## Presidential Issue

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John Quincy Adams, 6th President, 1825-1829

At fourteen, secretary to the United States minister to Russia, Adams was often in the presence of statesmen, soldiers, and politicians. Minister to Holland, Prussia, England and Russia. Member of the Massachusetts Senate and of the United States Senate. During the War of 1812 President Madison sent him to England to negotiate the terms of peace which finally resulted in the Treaty of Ghent. Twenty-eight years after his father, John Adams, became President, John Quincy Adams took the oath of office—the only President whose father has likewise been so honored. His administration was chiefly devoted to improving the efficiency of all branches of the government and to extending commerce with foreign countries. Returned to Washington as a representative to Congress. (1757-1848)

THE LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

On 24 February, 1924, in the beautiful Library of Congress, America set up a shrine in which the original Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States will be permanently preserved. These immortal documents are now fully protected from the ravages of time, and at the same time accessible to the public.



Andrew Jackson, 7th President, 1829-1837

Born in the then wilderness along the border between North and South Carolina, "Old Hickory" received most of his education in the school of experience. A fearless youth, ever true to his friends. Became interested in and studied law as a young man. Moved to Tennessee; a delegate to the state convention; helped frame the state constitution; elected to the national House of Representatives. A hero in the War of 1812. Victorious in the invasion of Florida in the Seminole War, later becoming governor of that territory. Liked by the common people, elected to the presidency with wild enthusiasm, serving two terms, Jackson, a powerful and popular figure, holds a unique place in the political history of the nation. (1767-1845)

### SIGNING THE CONSTITUTION

When the Federal Convention of 1787, at which George Washington presided, framed and submitted to the thirteen States for adoption the present Constitution of the United States, it became the organic law on its ratification by the ninth state, New Hampshire, on 21 June, 1788. The Revolution made us an independent people; the Constitution a united people — a true American nation. One of the most powerful, prosperous and stable governments in the world.

## Presidential Issue



Martin Van Buren, 8th President, 1837-1841

Ever interested in politics, a clever political leader, Van Buren was appointed emergency general of New York, then elected to the United States Senate, and later made governor of New York. As secretary of state in Andrew Jackson's cabinet he had a large share in shaping national policies. Vice president during Jackson's second term. Throughout Van Buren's presidency, war with the Seminole Indians, revolutionary disturbances in Mexico and Ontario, and financial panic created political discontent. The panic of 1837 emphasized the question of the method of handling public money, and it was on that issue that Van Buren is said to have made his greatest contribution as a statesman. He established an independent treasury system which, with changes and improvements, is still in use. (1762-1862)



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
William Henry Harrison, 9th President, 1841

A family of statesmen—His father, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence—His grandson, years later to become President of the United States—Harrison lived at the time the country was extending its western frontier. As aid-de-camp, he accompanied "Mad" Anthony Wayne in his military campaigns against the Indians throughout the Northwest Territory where the white settlers were continually in danger. Governor of this vast territory extending from the Ohio River to the Rocky Mountains—Well known for his part in the Battle of Tippecanoe, and the Battle of the Thames against the combined Indian and British forces—Served in both houses of Congress and in the Ohio Senate, and appointed United States minister to Colombia. Only one month after his inauguration, President Harrison passed away. (1773-1841)

John Tyler, 10th President, 1841-1845


Born at Greenway, Charles City County, Virginia, Tyler received a good education and chose the profession of law. He held public office in the Virginia House of Delegates, in both houses of Congress, and was governor of Virginia for one term. With William Henry Harrison heading the presidential ticket, Tyler won the vice presidency—The popular slogan of the campaign "Tippecanoe and Tyler too." Harrison's untimely death just one month after inauguration thrust the responsibilities of the nation on John Tyler, at a time when feeling ran high between states. Strict construction of the Constitution was one of his principles and he had rigid views on matters of public policy. (1790-1862)
