The Columbian Series was issued in 1893 to commemorate the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America by Christopher Columbus. The set consists of sixteen stamps, each bearing a design depicting various important scenes in this epochal event. This issue was placed on sale in January, 1893, except the 8c value, which appeared in March of 1893. Scenes making up this group were taken from prominent works of art in existence throughout the world.



The stamps were issued to commemorate and publicize the exposition which had for its theme. "To illustrate the progress of the New World during the 19th Century."

Authorized by a joint resolution of Congress, the Postmaster General issued a 2¢ stamp commemorating the 100th anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln. Date of first sale was February 12, 1909. A bust from St. Gauden's statue of Lincoln appears on the stamp.




William H. Seward

The successful termination of World War I brought forth a special 3¢ Victory Stamp with its first day sale at Washington, D. C., in March, 1919. A composite, featuring Liberty in front of massed flags, is the central design of the stamp.



Here once the embattled farmers stood and fired the shot heard round the world", stands inscribed.

This 2c stamp featuring the Liberty Bell was issued for the 150th anniversary of American Independence, which was celebrated at the Sesquicentennial Exposition held in Philadelphia in 1926.

Memorializing John Ericsson, builder of the "Monitor," this stamp was issued in 1926 when a statue of him was unveiled in Washington, D. C., by the Crown Prince of Sweden.

Surrender of Burgoyne

The Surrender of Burgoyne at Saratoga marked the end of a campaign in which the Battles of Fort Stanwix, Oriskany, Bennington and Saratoga played an important part in the winning of the American Revolution.

LINDBERGH

1927



Spirit of Saint Louis

This stamp, placed on sale June 18, 1927, marks Charles A. Lindbergh's non-stop solo flight from New York to Paris in his "Spirit of St. Louis" in May of 1927, the first successful such flight.

VERMONT

1927



Green Mountain Boy

A Green Mountain Boy, one of the colonist heroes of the Battle of Bennington, is shown on this stamp, which was issued to mark the 150th anniversary of the Battle and of Vermont's independence.

WHITE PLAINS

Battle of White Plains

A painting by E. F. Ward adoms the stamp issued to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Battle of White Plains. It was here at White Plains where the "Liberty or Death" flag first made its appearance.

VALLEY FORGE

Washington at Prayer

A critical period in American Revolutionary history was the encompment of George Washington's Army at Valley Forge. This stamp, picturing Washington at Prayer, was issued on the 150th anniversary.

Great interest in the mail carrying flights of the Graf Zeppelin prompted the Post Office Department to issue this set of three stamps in connection with the Europe-Pan American Flight. This was one of the more important flights of the great German airship which carried it from Germany to South America, thence to Lakehurst and back to Germany in a huge triangle. The stamps were placed on sale April 19, 1930 at Washington, D. C. and at selected post offices in the forty-eight states on April 21st.

Graf Zeppelin between Friedrichshafen and Chicago

Germany sent the Airship Graf Zeppelin as her messenger of good will to the CENTURY OF PROGRESS EXPOSITION in Chicago the Fall of 1933. The ship carried special souvenir letters for which the 50c stamp was issued on October 2, 1933.

Colony Seal

Commemorating the 300th anniversary of the founding of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, this 2¢ stamp carrying the seal of the colony was placed on sale April 8, 1930.

Issued to commemorate the 260th anniversary of the fouding of the Province of Carolina, as well as the 250th anniversary of Charleston, S. C.

BATTLE OF YORKTOWN

BATTLE OF BRADDOCK 1930



Statue of Col. Washington

The Battle of Braddock stamp honors the 175th anniversary of this historical struggle in American History. First placed on sale July 9, 1930.

This stamp, printed in red and black, commemorates the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown, marking the successful conclusion of the American Revolution.

General Von Steuben

Issued to honor his exceptional services in drilling and organizing the army in the Colonial cause during the Revolu-tionary War and for the 200th anniversary of his birth.

GENERAL PULASKI

1931



General Pulaski

General Casimir Pulaski, Polish patriot and hero of the American Revolution, received recognition by the issuance of this stamp on the 150th anniversary of his death.

Appearing with General George Washington on the stamp are Count de Rochambeau and Admiral de Grasse who materially aided to defeat the British at Yorktown.

Featured are portraits of the first President by different artists, showing him at various times of life. Charles Willson Peale did the portraits on the $\frac{1}{2}$ c, $\frac{1}{2}$ c, $\frac{3}{2}$ c, and 5c values; Gilbert Stuart the 2c and 10c denominations; John Trumbull the 6c and 7c; Charles B. J. F. Saint Memim the 8c; W. Williams the 9c; Houdon the bust on the 1c; and Charles Peale Polk the 4c stamp.

Marching Workers

Issued to arouse and stimulate support of the National Recovery Act of 1933 during the emergency which confronted the nation at that time.

KOSCIUSKO



Gen. Kosciusko Statue

The stamp in honor of Geneal Thaddeus Kosciusko was issued in connection with the one hundred liftieth anniversary of his naturalization as an American citizen.

Ark and Dove

The "Ark and the Dove", from a drawing, was used as the central theme for this stamp commemorating the 300th anniversary of the settlement of Maryland.

MOTHERS DAY



Whistler's Mother PERF 11

This stamp was issued as a tribute to the Mothers of America. To the right of the center, and facing left, is a reproduction of the painting by James McNeill Whistler, entitled "Portrait of My Mother." This design was printed by the flat plate process perforation 11, and rotary

press perforation 11 x 10½.


CENTURY OF PROGRESS SOUVENIR EXHIBITION SHEET

Specially issued for use on letters mailed thru the Little America post office in the territory of the South Pole. This stamp was sold officially at the Philatelic Agency, Washington, D. C., only.

Nicolet's Landing

Issued for the 300th anniversary of the arrival of the French explorer, Jean Nicolet, on the shores of Green Bay, who, according to historical records, was the first white man to reach the territory now comprised in the State of Wisconsin.






























BOULDER DAM

1935



Boulder Dam

Boulder Dam is one of the great American engineering achievements. This stamp, showing the gorge above and the construction work below, was issued to commemorate its completion.

CONNECTICUT

1935



Charter Oak

This issue commemorates the tercentenary of the settlement of Connecticut. The Charter Oak, famous for the hiding of the Charter incident in early Connecticut history, forms the design for the stamp.

RHODE ISLAND

1936



Roger Williams

Roger Williams founded a settlement in Narragansett Bay in 1636. He called it Providence, and it marked the beginning of the colony of Rhode Island.

TRANSPACIFIC AIR MAIL

1935



China Clipper

Inauguration of the first trans-Pacific air mail service from San Francisco to the Philippine Islands took place in November 1935. This commemorative stamp was issued first day on November 22nd in time for the first flight. Contractor was Pan American Airways flying the now famous Chino Clippers.

MICHIGAN

1935



State Seal

Alvin R. Meissner designed this stamp, issued November 1, 1935 to honor the 100th anniversary of the admission of Michigan to the Union. Typical views of the state complement the Seal.

CALIFORNIA PACIFIC

1935



San Diego Exposition

The exhibition grounds of the California Pacific International are shown on this stamp issued on May 29, 1935. The occasion for the Exposition was the 400th anniversary of San Diego.

TEXAS

1936



The Alamo

Issued to mark the centennial of Texas independence and the beginning of the Texas Republic in 1836, this stamp shows two Texan heroes, Sam Houston and Stephen F. Austin, plus The Alamo in San Antonio.

The States of Idaho, Oregon, Washington, parts of Montana and Wyoming form the map showing the old Oregon Trail on this stamp commemorating the original Northwest Territory.

This special sheet of four imperforate stamps, embracing the Connecticut, California Pacific Exposition, Texas, and Michigan issues; was provided in compliment to the Third International Philatelic Exposition 1936 at Grand Central Palace, New York.

ARMY



Mt. Vernon

George Washington, Washington's home at Mount Vernon, and General Nathaniel Greene are pictured on this stamp. General Greene distinguished himself at the engagements of Trenton and Princeton and at the battle of Brandywine during the Revolutionary War.



The Hermitage

Andrew Jackson, who won a notable victory over the British and was twice President of the United States, is shown along with his home, "The Hermitage" on the 2¢ stamp. To the right appears Winfield Scott, Commander in Chief of the U. S. Army. In the War against Mexico, he captured Vera Cruz and later entered Mexico City.



West Point

West Point, the United States Military Academy, was opened July 4, 1802. With few exceptions, all military commanders of the United States graduated from this Academy.



Gens. Sherman, Grant and Sheridan

General U. S. Grant (center) was in command of the entire Union Army during the Civil War and later elected President of the United States. General William Tecumseh Sherman (left) is known for his famous march thru Georgia to the sea which divided the South in the Civil War. General Philip H. Sheridan (right) in maneuvering his army across the Confederate line of retreat at Appomatiox hastened the end of the Civil War.



Stratford Hall

Robert E. Lee (left) commanded the forces of the South in the Civil War, was a worthy general, and earned the respect of both sides for his exemplary conduct. His birthplace, Stratford Hall, is also shown. Thomas Jonathan Jackson (right) gained his nom de guerre of "Stonewall" at Bull Run. He was a tower of strength against the Union Army in his support of General Lee.



ARMY AND NAVY SERIES

1936 - 37



Jones and Barry

John Paul Jones was the first naval personality to raise the Stars and Stripes over an American Warship. The Bon Homme Richard, (center), conquered and captured the British "Serapia" while under command of Commodore John Paul Jones. John Barry was called "The Father of the American Navy." He commanded the Brig Lexington, (center), in 1776.



Decatur and MacDonough

Stephen Decatur, a daring naval officer, commanded the "Intrepid" in the war against Tripoli. His daring put an end to the piratical acts by the Barbary states against the American and European nations. Thomas MacDonough was a member of Decatur's party, which burned the Philadelphia. He was commander of the fleet on Lake Champlain in the War of 1812.



Farragut and Porter

David Glasgow Farragut commanded the Fleet during the Civil War. He captured New Orleans and destroyed the Confederate fleet of 13 gunboats and two ironclads. David Dixon Porter in command of the Powhatan (center) in the Civil War, aided Farragut at Vicksburg.



NAVY

Sampson, Dewey and Schley

William Thomas Sampson graduated from
the Naval Academy in 1861 and saw service in the Civil War. George Dewey
graduated from the Naval Academy under
the age of 20. In the Spanish American
War he commanded the Asiatic Squardon
and on orders to the Philippines he engaged and destroyed the Spanish fleet at
Manila without losing a man. Winfield
Scott Schley graduated from the Naval
Academy in 1860. Served under Farragut
during the Mississippi campaign.



Seal of Naval Academy

The Naval Academy was founded at the Naval School, Annapolis, Md. in 1845. This is the School at which the executive officers of the United States Navy receive their education.



ORDINANCE OF 1787





Washington Irving

1783 - 1859

Author of first great book of comic literature by an American; Diedrich Knicker-bocker's "A History of New York" (1809). Story of Rip Van Winkle is in "The Sketch Book." Author of travel books and biographies of Columbus and Washington.

AUTHORS



Ralph Waldo Emerson

1803 - 1882

Poet, essayist, churchman. Born in Boston, lived there all his life In 1837 he delivered Phi Beta Kappa oration at Harvard. Called "The American Scholar," it has been described as "our intellectual Declaration of Independence."



James Fenimore Cooper 1789 - 1851

Early American novelist famous for romantic pictures of the American frontier, First success was "The Spy" (1821). Author of the "Leather-stocking" saga which includes such novels as "Last of the Mohicans," "The Deerslayer," and "The Pioneers."



Louisa May Alcott

1832 - 1888

"Flower Fables," her first book, written when she was 16. Active in woman's suffrage and temperance movements. Her novels "Little Men" and "Little Women" were immediately popular when published and still are. Influenced by Emerson.



Samuel L. Clemens

1835 - 1910

Known as "Mark Twain," he gained national renown as a lecturer as well as a novelist and humorist. Such novels as "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn," "Tom Sawyer," and "The Prince and the Pauper" still delight children and adults too.

POETS



Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

1807 - 1882

Published first poem when he was 13. Appointed Professor of Modern Languages and Belles-lettres at Harvard when he was just 28. A bust of him is in the Poets' Corner in Westminster Abbey, London, an unusual honor for an American.



John Greenleaf Whittier

1807 - 1892

Though his reputation as a poet has faded since his day, "Snow-Bound" still is considered a masterpiece. An abolitionist, he worked ardently against slavery. Some well-known poems: "The Barefoot Boy," "Ichabod," and "Swan Song."



James Russell Lowell

1819 - 1891

Foremost man of letters in America of his day. Editor of "The Atlantic Monthly." Succeeded Longfellow at Harvard when the elder poet retired. Famous as essayist as well as poet, Born and died in the same house in Cambridge, Mass.



Walt Whitman

1819 - 1892

A thoroughly American poet, steeped in the youth and vitality of his country. Not popular in his lifetime because he ignored the conventions of poetry. "Leaves of Grass," scarcely read in the 19th century, now a classic of our literature.



James Whitcomb Riley

1849 - 1916

Born in little town of Greenfield, Indiana. Remembered as "the Hoosier poet." Created many memorable characters in his poems. Famous for those poems in the Hoosier dialect, such as "Old Schoolboy Romances" and "Rhymes of Childhood."



1940



Horace Mann

1796 - 1859

First head of the Massachusetts Board of Education; had national influence on American education. President of Antioch College, Ohio, and Representative in Congress. Founded "Common School Journal" (1838) and edited it for ten years.



Frances E. Willard

1839 - 1898

President of World's Women's Christian Temperance Union, president of National Council of Women. Active in cause of woman's suffrage. Organizer of the Prohibition Party in 1882, Professor of Aesthetics at Women's College, Evanston, Illinois.



Mark Hopkins

1802 - 1887

Great teacher, Graduate of Williams College, Mass. Was President of it from 1836 to 1872. U.S. President James A, Garfield said his ideal of a college would be a log in the woods with a student at one end and Mark Hopkins at the other end.

EDUCATORS



Charles W. Eliot

1834 - 1926

President of Harvard University for forty years; most influential leader in education of his day. Greatly expanded school and introduced such things as the elective system of choosing courses and sabbatical leaves for faculty members.



Booker T. Washington

1856 - 1915

Educator of the Negro. Nationwide speaker on race relations and education. His main points in lectures: an education fitted for life, the need of keeping close to nature, and of cultivating the respect of one's neighbors — white or black.

John James Audubon

1785 - 1851

America's best-known naturalist, Studied birds in their natural habitats, "Birds of America" is a collection of his paintings. As early as 1804 he conducted "banding" experiments on birds to keep track of their habits and movements.



Dr. Crawford W. Long

1815 - 1878

Received medical degree in 1839 from University of Pennsylvania. Practiced surgery in New York for two years, then returned home to Georgia. There he performed the first operation on a patient under complete anaesthesia from ether.



Luther Burbank

1849 - 1926

Great horticulturist. He originated many new varieties of fruits, flowers, vegetables, grains, and grasses. Born in Mass., but settled later in Santa Rosa, Calif., "the chosen spot," as he called it, where he did all his work.



Dr. Walter Reed

1851 - 1902

U.S. Army surgeon and bacteriologist. Head of the U.S. Army Yellow Fever Commission, which did much to control yellow fever and eventually to wipe it out. Professor of Pathology and Bacteriology at Columbia University Medical School.

SCIENTISTS



Jane Addams

1860 - 1935

A great humanitarian. She was a sociologist, an economist, a lecturer, and an author. Was a co-founder and guiding spirit of Hull House in Chicago, where much social work was done. A winner of the Nobel Peace Prize for her work.



UNITED STATES POSTAGE

Stephen Collins Foster 1826 - 1864

Though known for his songs of the South, he made just one visit to that part of the country. Rest of his life was spent mainly in Pittsburgh, New York and Cincinnati. Wrote songs for Negro minstrels popular in music halls at the time.



Edward A. MacDowell

1861 - 1908

Composer of highly original and very colorful music. A lyrical quality to all his work. His symphonic poems include "Hamlet and Ophelio," "Lancelot and Elaine," and "The Saracens." Preferred song to drama; never wrote an opera because of this.





John Philip Sousa 1854 - 1932

Conductor of the U.S. Marine Band 1880-1892; brought fame to it and himself. Then started own band; successful throughout world. Raised millions in Liberty Loan drives. His march "Stars and Stripes Forever" alone earned him \$300,000.



Victor Herbert 1859 - 1924

Success as composer of light opera; but he started in serious music. Was conductor of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra from 1898 to 1904. Famous for "Babes in Toyland," "Naughty Marietto," "Red Mill," and others. Born in Ireland.



Ethelbert Nevin

1862 - 1901

His song "The Rosary" is one of the most famous songs by an American composer. Studied piano under famous teachers in Europe. Debuted as pianist in 1886 in Boston; but his success as a composer led him to give up the concert stage for composition.



1940

ARTISTS



Gilbert Charles Stuart

1755 - 1828

Went to London in 1775 when twenty. Quickly gained success as a portrait painter. Returned to America in 1793 popular here too. Best known for his portraits of Washington. Also painted Adams, Jefferson, Monroe, and Madison.



James A. McNeal Whistler

1834 - 1903

Painter and etcher, famous on the continent as well as in the United States. Best known painting is that of his mother, popularly known as "Whistler's Mother." Painted a portrait of English essayist Thomas Carlyle that is well-known.



Augustus Saint-Gaudens

1848 - 1907

Sculptor who gained a reputation for being an innovator, a flouter of convention. Statue of Admiral Farragut in New York City's Madison Square Gorden a landmark in history of American sculpture. Did many figures for homes of famous people.



Daniel Chester French

1850 - 1931

Two of his most famous works of sculpture are the colossal bronze of Lincoln for the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., and the statue of Lafayette at Easton, Pa. Winner of many awards for his work, both in the United States and in Europe.



Frederick Remington

1861 - 1909

Painter, illustrator, author, and sculptor. Leading artist of the American Indian. Born in New York and lived there, but made many trips west to study his subjects. Great ability to render character and action in his paintings and sculptures.



INVENTORS



Eli Whitney 1765 - 1825

His extensive experience on a cotton plantation in the South eventually led to his invention of the cotton gin for separating the cotton seed from the fiber. He became later in life, an extremely successful manufacturer of firearms.



Samuel F. B. Morse 1791 - 1872

Successful portrait painter; Professor of Painting and Sculpture at New York University. He had little in the way of mechanical skill, but did have an inventive type of mind. This inventiveness led to his invention of the telegraph.



Cyrus H. McCormack 1809 - 1884

When 22 he invented and took out a patent for a hillside plow. When his father gave up trying to perfect a reaping machine after 20 years' work, Cyrus took over the project. In 1832 he exhibited a reaper on farms throughout Virginia.



Elias Howe 1819 - 1867

From early youth he liked nothing better than to tinker with machinery in his father's mills in Mass. In 1846 he secured a patent for a sewing machine, but couldn't interest anyone. He went to England where he sold the rights for under \$1,000.



Alexander Graham Bell 1847 - 1922

Inventor of the telephone and leading educator of the deaf. He was born in Scotland and studied at the University of Edinburgh and University College, London, In the last 25 year of his life aviation was his main interest.

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
