

Letter dated 4 January 1917 from APO SZ 8 (Sacher type A, serial B) without censor markings. Thought to be located in Kantara 1915 - 1917, and in Sinai in early 1917. As the campaign progressed, it moved to Gaza, then to Ramleh-Lod-Jerusalem and reached Beyrouth by 26 October 1918. It was always an Advanced Base APO. It is backstamped 17 January 1917 in Nottingham.

This particular envelope type #AFW3078 is known as "green envelope" and were rationed to other ranks at the rate of 2 or 3 per week. These were much sought after as they were not subject to regimental unit censorship but only to base censorship. The were many O.R.'s (security apart) who were unwilling to write personal and intimate details to their loved ones which were to be read by their own regimental officers





Thought to be located at Lod at this time, but known to be at Gaza, then Ramleh-Lod-Jerusalem and reached Beyrouth by 26 October 1918. It was always an Advanced Base APO. It is listed with locations at Kantara, Sinai, Gaza & Ramleh.



Thought to be located somewhere between El Ferdan nad Gaza at this time, this was a forward office which eventually moved up to Rehovoth in 1918, after the campaign had opened with the capture of Beersheba at the end of October 1917. an undistinguishable cancel is on the back; probably an arrival cancel.






Picture Postcard dated 15 October 1917 from APO SZ 14 stationed at Deir el Belah with a red triangular cansor. The card indicates the new address "Wireless Section - 5th Wing Royal Flying Corps, Egypt" and was written 9 days after the formation of the new designation for the 5th Wing. The unit was part of the Palestine Brigade and was on the L of C.





Military Mail Army Post Office SZ 27

Letter dated 30 October 1917 from APO SZ 27 (Sacher tpe A, serial A) with the rare "green dumb" censor mark. This correspondent was known to be in the 159th Infantry Brigade as part of the 53rd Infantry Division which at this time was standing by in the neighborhood of El Buggar. After the fall of Beersheba on 31 October 1917, they began the attack on the heights of Tel Khuweilfeh

Letter dated 24 December 1918 mailed from Jerusalem to Cairo was post-marked APO SZ32 seven times over a block of ten 5mil (Scott#8) stamps. There is a Censor #2 marking on the face while the reverse has an arrival postmark dated 26 December 1918 in Cairo

Letter dated 21 March 1918 mailed from Jerusalem to Cairo was postmarked APO SZ44 and franked with a 1 Piastre stamp (Scott #2). There is a red rectangular censorship #1 stamp on the face. The reverse has two APO SZ10 (Cairo) postmarks dated 25 March 1918 and a Cairo

arrival postmark also dated 25 March 1918.

Registered letter dated 25 June 1918 mailed from Jerusalem to Paris and postmarked APO SZ44 - three times (once on Registration label) and is franked with two 1 Piastre (Scott #2) stamps. The reverse has a Censor #2 mark, and the following postmarks - APO SZ44 (Jerusalem), FPO GM1 (GHQ Jerusalem), transit postmark APO S100 dated 8 July 1918 (Tranto, Italy) and a Paris receival mark.



The reverse has a Censor #2 stamp, APO SZ44 (Jerusalem) FPO GM1 (GHQ, EEF, 1st Echelon, Jerusalem) Transit postmark APO S100 dated 8 July 1918 (Taranto, Italy) and a receival mark from Paris.



The reverse has a Censor #1 mark, APO SZ44 (Jerusalem), FPO GM1 (GHQ Jerusalem) APO SZ10 dated 7 December 1918 (Cairo) and a Cairo receival stamp dated 7 Dec. 18

The post marks are APO-SZ45 (Sacher Type A) with transit marks at Jerusalem FPO GM1 dated 10 Nov 1918 (Sacher Type L), Port Said APO SZ 22 dated 12 Nov 1918 (Sacher Type B), a Port Said civilian mark dated 12 Nov 1918 and an arrival postmark dated 16 December 1918. The arrival mark is albeled Geneva Distr. Letter. The letter has white censor label over the opened side.

Military Mail Field Post Office 159

Letter dated 5 February 1918 from FPO 159 (Sacher type O, serial A) with black triangular censor. This was the 159th Infantry Brigade as part of the 53rd Division, and was located with the XX Corps during the capture of Jericho. The 159th was actually near Beitin with the 158th and 160th on either side.

The 53rd Infantry Division was originally composed of Territorial battalions, and laned in Egypt from Gallipoli. It took part in the advance from the Suez Canal, the first and second battles of Gaza, and eventually joined the XX corps upon its formation in August 1917.



Military Mail Field Post Office 159

Letter dated 22 May 1918 from FPO 159 (Sacher type O, serial A) with black triangular censor. This was the 159th Infantry Brigade, 53rd Infantry Division, XX Corps. While the Corps was at Amman & es Salt, The 159th reached the south bank of Wady Kola on 11 March 1918 and the Division remained in the same sector (Tel Assur south of Attara) of the line throughout the summer.

NOTE: FPO censor strikes are generally found in Black, whereas the SZ & APO strikes are usually found in Red.

June 29, 1917

This registered letter with a 2p. Registration Charge from F.P.O. 162 (162nd Inf. Div.) in Gaza passed thru censorship as noted by the violet triangular PASSED CENSOR NO. 3751 and black STAR.

The reverse shows the transit pmks. of A.P.O. 'SZ 14' dated June 29th, BASE A.P.O. 'Z' dated June 30th, and BASE A.P.O. 'Z' (in Dir El Balah) dated July 1st. The arrival pmk. is of the MILITARY POST OFFICE, ALEXANDRIA dated July 1st.







The envelope is postmarked FPO-CD3 Sacher Type L Serial X and according to Firebrace formed the 3rd Section Suez Canal Defences. On December 7th the Desert Column was formed from Section 3. There is a triangular red censor stamp #3255 as well as transit marks of APO SZ9 located in Kantara dated 5 December 1916 and BAPO Z located in Alexandria dated 7 December 1916 and an arrival postmark on 7 December 1916 in Alexandria.

JUDAICA

"In Aid of Suffering Jews in Poland"

According to "Stamp Collecting" (Mar. 16, 1940), prominent Kingston, Jamaica residents, headed by Mr. Lewis Aschenheim, had started a "Jamaica War Stamp League" prior to the issue of the Official War Stamps.

The League had a threefold objective of assisting the British Red Cross Society, aiding suffering Jews in Poland, and creating the "Jamaica Aeroplane Fund".

Note that one label is clear while the other is overprinted with the word "JAMAICA".
