

The Egyptians have made sweeping gains over the past 12 weeks, unreported till now, against Royalist forces in Yemen's "unknown war."

war."
Their advances must be viewed with disquiet in Britain. If Nasser's armies gain full control of the country, it will pose a serious and continuing threat to the South Arabian Federationincluding Aden.
For Nasser has no interest in Yemen itself—one of the poorest and most primitive countries in the world. He requires it as a beachhead on the Arabian peninsular, whence he can strike south at the Federation—or north and east at the immense oil wealth o fSaudi Arabia and beyond.

In a hard week of hazardous desert travel, my son and I traversed Royalist Yemen—covering over 700 miles by truck.

I report with personal regret the assassination last month of Prince Ali bin Hussein, younger brother of Muhammad, whom I met in Qara last May. In fact he acted as my interpreter when I interviewed the Iman—his first cousin—for the Evening Standard

Ali was shot dead near Amara by two shots from a service rifle at a rang of about 100 yards. He was struck in the head and heart and died instantly.

Twelve suspects have been arrested but the identity of the killer is still unknown

Ali, in his early twenties, was a delightful and popular young man—easy-going, full of warmth and laughter, and not given to political intrigue. Some believe the assassin mistook him for Muhammad, who had left the area only an hour previously, Muhammad, in prestige and power, is now probably third in the Maleki hierarchy after the Imam himself and Prince Hasan. He was himself wounded in action at Hunja when a heavy bomb from a MiG fell at the very entrance of his cave, killing 15 members of his close entourage and bodyguard

In listing these Royalist losses, I do not wish to give the impression that resistance is crumbling, Morale is still remarkably high and large areas of mountain and desert are still firmly held.





EGYPTIAN forces in the Yemen have been withdrawing from their more isolated positions in the past weeks. They appear to be concentrating at their main

garrison towns, where there are landing grounds for air-

they withdraw Royalists have been taking over their positions. I was told by Sheikh Hameas Aujuri, commander of the Royalists in the Nushure area north of Sada, that his troops were already in positions within five miles of Sada.

There are two possible explanations for these moves.

The first is that they have decided to give up the costly task of trying to control the outlying areas, where it is obvious that the local population is completely Royalist in sympathy, and to concentrate in force on the main garrison towns.

The second is that they are planning a withdrawal.

Driven from mountain

Although there have been local withdrawals by the Egyptians in the Sada area they have re-occupied some former positions in the Barash mountains, south-east of

The Royalist troops of Emir Ahmed ibn Hussein drove the Egyptians off the mountain about a week ago. capturing many weapons and claiming to have killed over 40 of the enemy.

The Royalists used so much ammunition in the attack that they ran out of supplies. No reserves were available.

They withdrew from the position with quantities of booty. The Egyptians moved back a few days later.

President Nasser has agreed that members of the Hamideddin royal dynasty should be able to take part in a future Yemeni Govern-ment. Previously he said that all the family must be banished.

Marshal Sallal, who is in Egypt where, during the past year he has spent more time than in the Yemen, could conceivably wreck the Jeddah agreement. But as he owes his position to Egyptian support this is unlikely.

Revolution "murdered"

The Baathist régime in Syria today vehemently attacks Presi-dent Nasser's compromising. The Damascus newspaper Al Thawra, the Baathist official organ, says: The "heroic" Yemeni revolution has been "foully murdered and its throat slit from ear to ear" by President Nasser.

The newspaper says Mr. Thomson, British Minister of State for Foreign Affairs, is visiting the Middle East "to dance on the grave of revolution." Mr. Thomson, arrived in Beirut last night. He is due in Damascus on Saturday. The newspaper says he is being received by the Arabs "only out of courtesy."

"No dancing on grave"

Mr. Thomson said tonight he had not come "to dance on anyone's grave." He added: "In a way, the reason for my visit is to prevent the kind of misunder-standing that leads to such comments."

NASSER & FEISAL AGREE ON YEMEN PEACE PLAN

IMMEDIATE CEASE-FIRE

JEDDAH, Tuesday.

GREEMENT on a peace plan to end the three-year A civil war in the Yemen was signed today by King Feisal of Saudi Arabia and President Nasser of Egypt.

A communiqué broadcast by Jeddah Radio at the end of their two-day talks said: "Armed fighting in Yemen will be stopped immediately and a joint peace commission from both sides will be formed."

Saudi Arabia and Egypt would co-operate in forming a transi-tional conference of 50 members, representing all the national forces and people of authority in Yemen. It would meet at Haradh, in the Yemen, on Nov. 23.

This conference would decide the system of government during the transitional period until a plebiscite had been held. It would also decide how the plebiscite should be run.

PROVISIONAL CABINET Military aid ended

The plebiscite is to be held not later than Nov. 23, 1966. The Haradh Conference will discuss the formation of a provisional Cabinet to hold office until the plebiscite.

Saudi Arabia agreed to stop military aid and the use of Saudi territory for operations against Yemen immediately. Egypt will withdraw all its military forces from Yemen within 10 months beginning on Nov. 23, 1965.

A joint peace commission from the Royalist and Republican sides will supervise the ceasefire will supervise the ceasefire through a special committee. It will also supervise the frontier and ports and stop all kinds of military aid. Food aid will continue under the supervision of the peace commission.

Egypt and Saudi Arabia will form a joint force to support the peace commission's operations.

King Feisal and President Nasser will remain in direct con-"to avoid any difficulties in in the way of carrying out this agreement," the broadcast communiqué added.

The basis of the talks had been to find a formula for the with-drawal of the Egyptian troops. Cairo obviously needed a formula that was face-saving.

King Feisal saw himself as a mediator. It was he who suggested the plebiscite and an interim Yemeni administration while the Egyptian troops withdrew.

Though President Nasser's reception in Jeddah was marked by traditional Saudi Arabian magnificence, in public it was cool. It was a far cry from the massed crowds and beflagged streets which the Egyptian Government organises for every visiting potentate.

President Nasser could hardly expect to be a popular hero. Only a month ago he was threatening to order his forces to invade Saudi Arabia.

King Feisal's prestige has been steadily rising throughout the Arab world during the last few months. On the other hand, President Nasser's policies have not been so much in doubt since Suez.

President Nasser left Jeddah tonight for Cairo in a special plane. King Feisal has accepted his invitation to visit Cairo, but no date has been fixed,

The Imam al Badr succeeded to the throne of the Yemen in Sep-tember 1962, on the death of his father, Imam Ahmad. Within days he was deposed, and reported killed, in an Army coup led by Col. Sallal, now President.

EGYPT BLUFF CALLED BY FEISAL

BEIRUT, Thursday. KING FEISAL of Saudi Arabia appears to have successfully called Cairo's bluff over threats to invade Saudi Arabia if that country continued to support Royalists in the Yemen civil war.

Today, after King Feisal received a conciliatory message from President Nasser, it was announced that the two leaders would meet shortly for talks on relations between their countries.

President Nasser now gives the impression of wishing to deflate the crisis in Egyptian-Saudi Arabian relations he touched off three weeks ago with his threats to attack Saudi territory bordering the Yemen.

Courteous but firm

Yesterday, Mr. Mohammed Aly Redha, Saudi Arabian Ambassador in Cairo, delivered to President Nasser what was thought to have been a courteous but firm message from King Feisal. He flew to Taif last night to deliver the President's reply to the King.

Cairo has obviously been sur-prised and embarrassed by Saudi Arabia's vigorous reaction to President Nasser's threats.

Strong units of the Saudi army, which have been re-equipped and retrained, have been moved into the Yemen border zone with the avowed intention of supporting Yemen Royalists against any Egyptian attacks.

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

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

EGYPT has proposed a partition of the Yemen into two States. One would be Republican, and the other Royalist.

This plan has been put before several Arab rulers, including King Feisal of Saudi Arabia, by Egyptian representatives. It has also been discussed with Yemeni Republican and Royalist leaders.

Diplomats believe that if Cairo secured partition of the Yemen, it would then attempt to create some form of union between Republican Yemenis of the Shafei sect of Sunni Islam and the South Arabia and Aden area, now within the British-protected South Arabian Federation, whose inhabitants are mainly Sunni.

YEMENI ROYALISTS SAY EGYPT BROKE TRUCE

'6,000 MORE TROOPS LAND'

agreement in August between President Nasser of Egypt and King Feisal of Saudi Arabia.

Egypt supports the Republican régime in the Yemen and King Feisal supports the exiled Imam Mohammed Al Badr and his Royalist followers. The conference broke up on Christmas Eve.

Mr. Wazir said two shiploads of Russian arms and "a consignment of 50,000 machine-guns from China" arrived in the Yemen during the conference.

Support from China

Mr. Ahmed Mohammed Shami, Royalist Foreign Minister and leader of the conference delegation, said he could confirm reports that China had pledged support to the Republican régime if the Egyptians left.

The Royalists got wind of Communist arms shipments while the Haradh talks were on. He said 3,000 Chinese technicians were working in the Yemen, building roads and a new textile mill at Sana.

T was in August of last year that President Nasser met King Feisal of Saudi Arabia in Jedda, where both signed an agreement aimed at ending the war in the Yemen.

Nasser had to submit to considerable loss of face in doing so and there were two schools of thought as to whether or not he was sincere.

Some believed that he really wanted to pull his troops out of the Yemen as the Egyptian economy was in no state to bear further losses, and he had realised that he had no hope of defeating the Royalists. Others considered that the agreement was a bluff to gain breathing space for his hardpressed troops to re-deploy and concentrate without further losses. It was also pointed out that America was at this time reconsidering its economic aid programmes amid mounting criticism that aid to Egypt was indirectly

nor Republican, and as a compromise the country be called the Islamic State of Yemen.

The conference ended with the dispersal of the delegates at the start of the Arab fasting month Ramadan, shortly Christmas, no agreement having been reached.

With Ramadan now over, there with Ramadan now over, there have been reports that another meeting between Royalist and Republican leaders will be arranged. Even if it takes place, however, there is still every chance that it will fail.

Meanwhile, the Egyptians have so far shown no signs of leaving. Indeed, Royalist sources in Aden have alleged that large numbers of Egyptian reinforcements have been arriving in the Yemen. Some claim that the Egyptian strength there exceeds 100,000.

There have also been reports of isolated incidents which could, if they increase, lead to a resumption of the war.

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

MORE EGYPTIAN RETREATS IN YEMEN FIGHTING

ROYALIST REAR H Q, AMARA, Yemen, Tuesday.

SIGNS of nervousness by the Egyptians that their forces in Yemen are vulnerable in too many places are being noted at Royalist Headquarters. The Egyptians have not

started a major offensive, which their reinforcements and concentration suggested was imminent.

Their troops have been withdrawn from three high features in the Barash area near Sada, in the north.

This news was given me on a visit to the headquarters of Emir Hassan Ibn Yahya, uncle of the Imam and Prime Minister of Royalist-held Yemen. He commands the Royalist 3rd Army in the mountains east of Sada.

The Egyptian soldiers withdrew to El Harf area, a strategic point on the Sana-Sada road. From here the only road still in Egyptian hands leads to the Jauf, El Hazm, and Marib.

Key road in danger

The direct road from Marib to Sana is already in Royalist hands. With the capture of Harib by the Royalists, who later advanced towards Marib, and Egyptian withdrawal from the important hill features of Al Juba, the situation in Marib is becoming precarious.

If the road were taken by the revolution.

Royalists, all the Egyptians in the east of the Yemen would be cut off. They would be subject to attack by Royalist soldiers and tribesmen with little chance to hit back.

Their tanks are practically useless in this area. Egyptian infantry are reluctant to get out of their Russian-built armoured troopcarriers. Republican tribesmen are disinclined to leave their tribal areas in the south to fight in the north.

Anti-Egyptian talks

Worse news for the Egyptians has come with the announcement that the sheikhs of the paramount tribes of north and central Yemen. Sheikh Nagi Ibn Ali Al Ghada. of the Bakhil, and Sheikh Abdullah Ibn Hussein Ibn Ahmer, of the Hashid, were meeting to discuss ways of driving the Egyptians out.

Until recently the Hashid was mainly Republican in sympathy Sheikh Abdullah Ibn Hussein Ibn Ahmer was Republican Minister of the Interior at the start of the revolution.

EGYPTIANS 'LOSE 2,000 IN YEMEN'

A BIG battle is raging in the Yemen between Royalists and Egyptian forces backing the Republicans. The Royalist Information Minister, Hashem ben Hashem, described the fighting as the fiercest since the war began in 1962.

It is going on a few miles east of Sanaa. The Egyptians are said to be using tanks and planes.

The Royalists say the Egyptians have lost more than 2.000 dead, 30 tanks and 60 armoured cars. The Egyptians have replied that several hundred Royalists have been killed but say their own and Republican casualties are "moderate."

Fighting has been going on for more than two weeks. It breaks the cease-fire agreement between President Nasser and King Feisal of Saudi Arabia, who supported the Royalists, signed at Jeddah last August.

'Outlaw' blamed

Egypt describes the operation as being against an outlaw named Qassem Munnasser, who with dissident tribesmen, had cut the highway east of Sanaa.

highway east of Sanaa.

The Royalist Information Minister says that Munnasser is the commander of the Royalist forces in the vicinity of Sanaa. The Egyptians are said to be using ground - to - ground missiles, launched from the outskirts of Sanaa.

News of the fighting coincides with the opening in Cairo of the Arab Heads of Government conference. It marks a further deterioration in relations between President Nasser and King Feisal.

The truce period, during which the Yemenis were supposed to have held a plebiscite to decide on their form of government, ends on Nov. 23. That date could mark a renewal of hostilities, with the civil war entering its fifth year.

'UNHOLY TERROR WAVE' Petition to U.N.

OUR UNITED NATIONS CORRES-PONDENT cabled last night: A petitioner from South Arabia, Mr. H. A. Bayoomi, today told the Trusteeship Committee that the Yemen was competing with Britain in subjecting Aden to "an unholy wave of terror."


