










This picture of the boy

of rock stars or movie stars today.


































The general utility wagon is similar to todays pick-up trucks.














1918




From Omaha, Nebraska to Oneida, New York February 25, 1918

S. Palmer of Madison, Alabama. It was canceled with a duplex canceler.


It was received on December 30, 1903 as posted by the CDS on the back.
