#### FIGHT AGAINST STORM

### PILOT'S TEMPESTUOUS JOURNEY

Captain Ronald Beresford, the pilot, had an exciting story to tell when he returned to Liverpool from Plymouth last evening. Immediately he left Speke, Captain Beresford, who has had eighteen years' flying experience to his credit and was with Kingsford Smith in Australia, was flung violently from his seat against a strut overhead, when he took off his helmet to don the wireless head-phones. After that he deemed it advisable to put on his padded helmet again.

"It was the worst flight in the whole of my flying experience," he said. "A terrific wind was blowing over the mountains, the full force of the violent gusts that lifted the plane spasmodically being experienced after leaving Birmingham over the Wye Valley. There were times," he interposed smilingly, "when I did not know whether the plane was

Captain Beresford flew the machine at a cruising speed of 110 miles an hour, at which rate over the ground he should have arrived from Birmingham at Bristol in an hour, but actually took an hour and thirty-five minutes, his cruising speed against the wind being cut down to less than sixty miles an hour over the ground. He, nevertheless, arrived back in Liverpool on the return journey according to schedule.

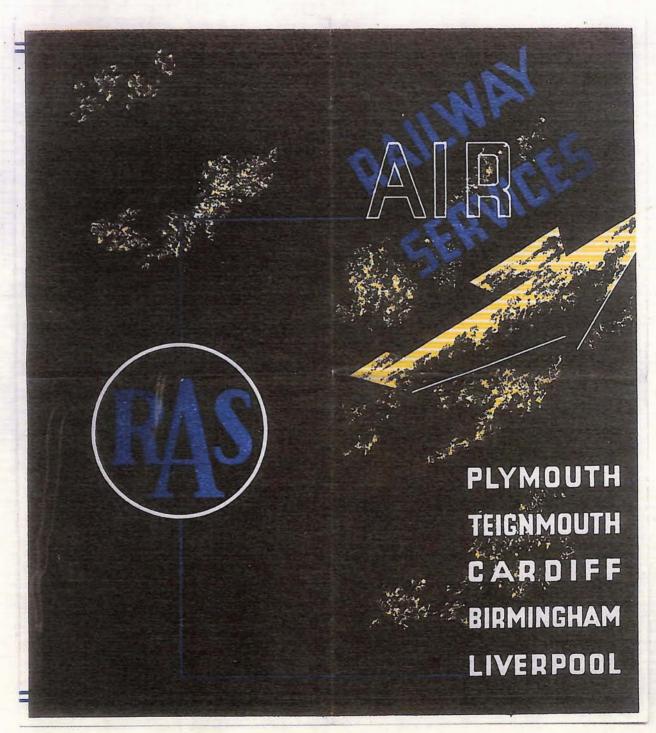

### NEW LIVERPOOL AIR SERVICE

#### TO PLYMOUTH AND ISLE OF WIGHT

Yet another air service from Liverpool Airport was officially inaugurated yesterday. It is between Liverpool and the Isle of Wight, and is operated by the Railway Air Services, which is sponsored by the railways and Imperial

sponsored by the railways and Imperial Airways, Ltd.

A 'plane for Plymouth has been leaving Liverpool Airport daily, but with this new service there will be scheduled services to Cardiff, Teignmouth, Southampton, and Cowes.

An eight-seater twin-engined liner operates the service, and when it left, shortly before nine, there were four passengers. It returned last night about 7.45, and brought three passengers.

passengers. It returned last night about 7.45, and brought three passengers. The full journey to Plymouth is scheduled to take about four hours. This new service will be run on modest lines at first, but should demand warrant it, extensions will at once be made.

The fares are as follow:—Cardiff 45s (single), and 70s (return); Southampton 65s and 110s, Cowes 70s and 117s 6d, Teignmouth 80s and 115s, and Plymouth 85s and 120s.

"This service will test still further the extent of the demand throughout the country as a whole for more and efficient air travel facilities," said an official. "Liverpool seems destined to become one of the great air centres of the country. We are proceeding with caution and ensuring financial stability by making the supply approximate, as by making the supply approximate, as closely as possible, with the demand."

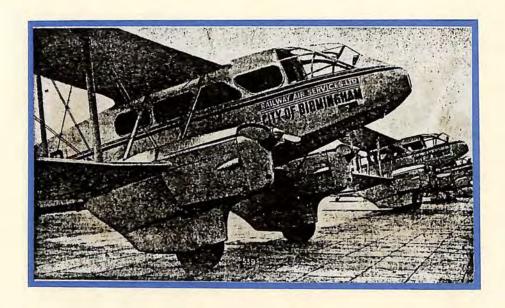

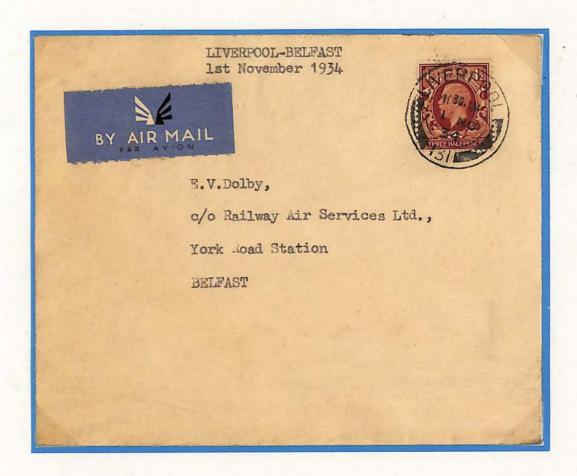

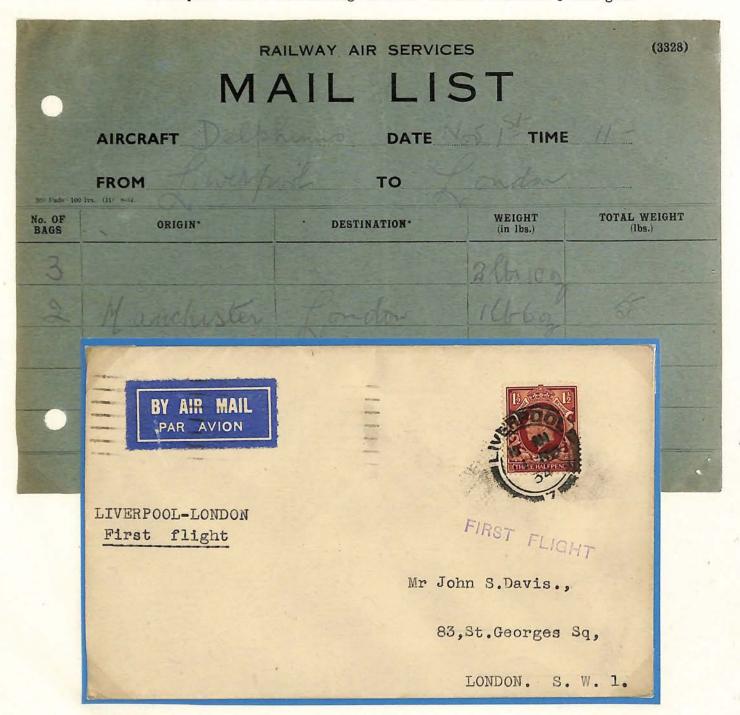
