Great Britain's 1840 Twopenny Blue Stamp

The 1840 Twopenny Blue Stamp was issued shortly after the Penny Black, and is considered the world's second postage stamp. The design is identical to the Penny Black, except for the denomination statement at the bottom and the heavy lines above and below Queen Victoria's portrait.

The Twopenny Blue was not perforated, so the individual stamps had to be cut or torn from an entire sheet of stamps. Using the same lettering system in the lower corners as the Penny Black, only one stamp from each 240-stamp sheet carries the same letters as the stamp on this page!

The Twopenny Blue Stamp contained herein is a genuine specimen of the world's second adhesive postage stamp. It was issued shortly after May 6, 1840 in Great Britain.

Fewer Twopenny Blues were printed than Penny Blacks, making them very desirable to collectors the world over. Since it is considered the world's second postage stamp, it adds significant historic value to every collection.

Great Britain's 1840 Penny Black Stamp

Issued on May 6, 1840, the world's first postage stamp cost one British Penny and made it possible to send a one-ounce letter for that small fee. The new British postal system became known as the "penny post" and the new stamp was called the "Penny Black."

The 1840 stamp was gummed but not perforated. It pictures the young Queen Victoria. The portrait was based on a commemorative medal minted during Victoria's first year as Queen, at the age of 18.
