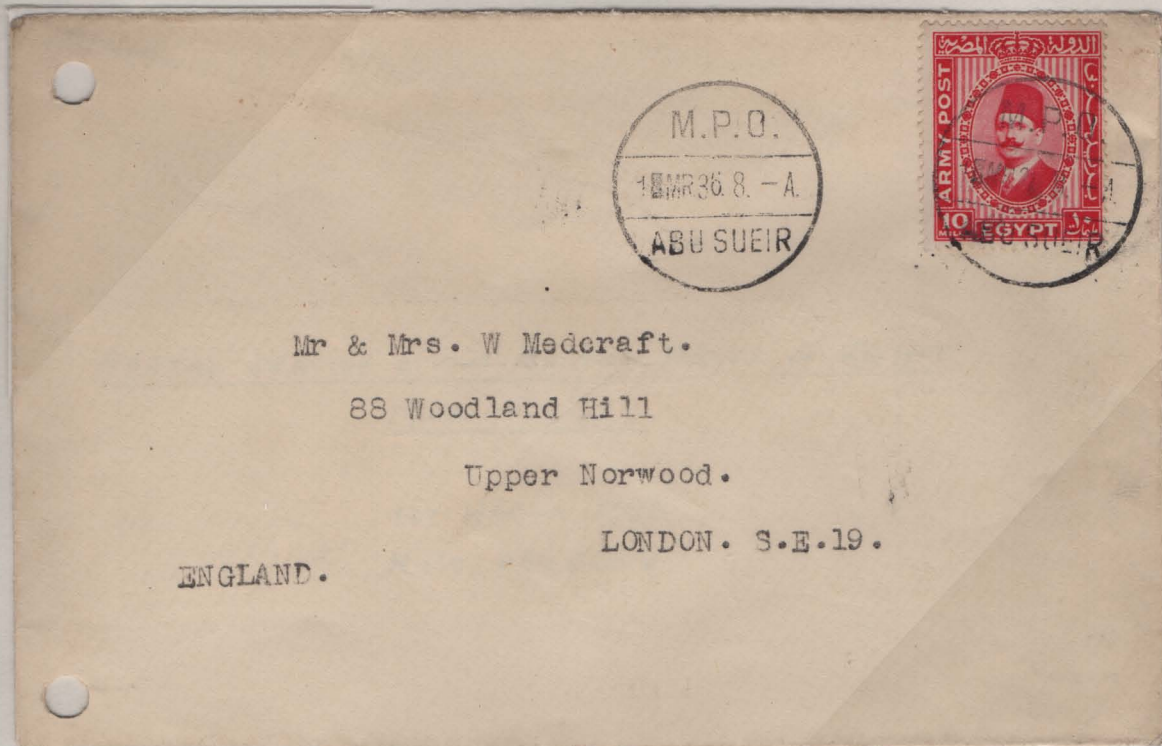
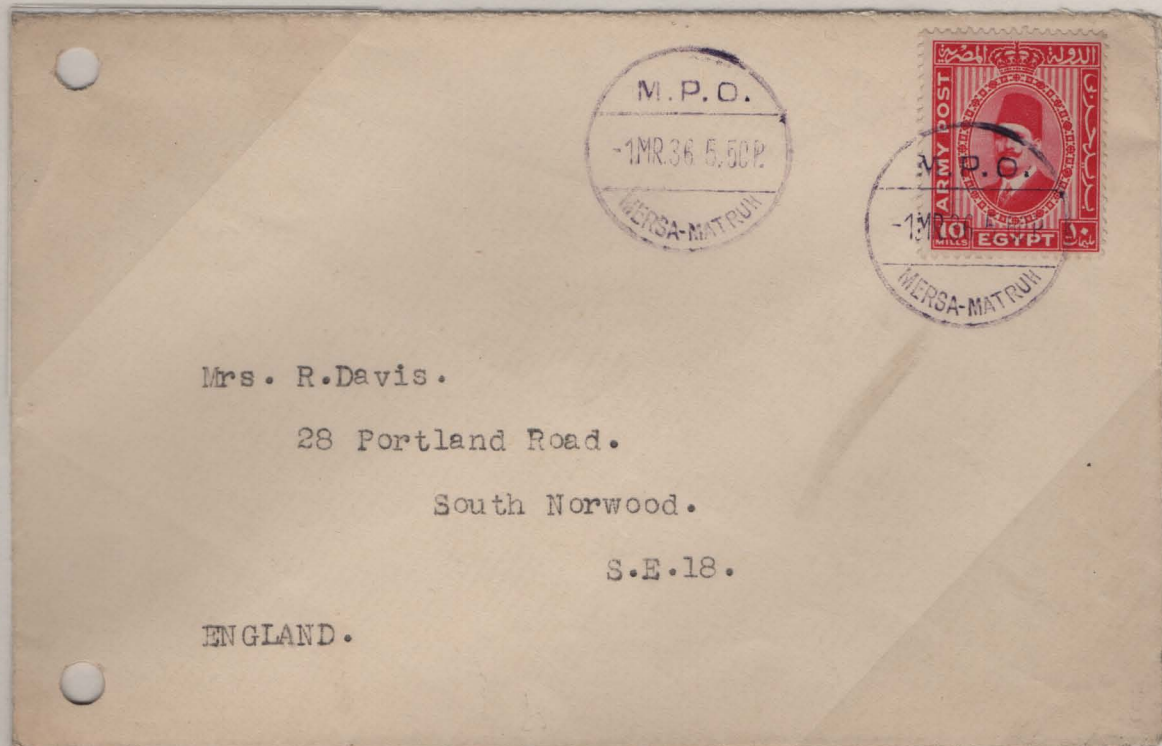

For Military Mail

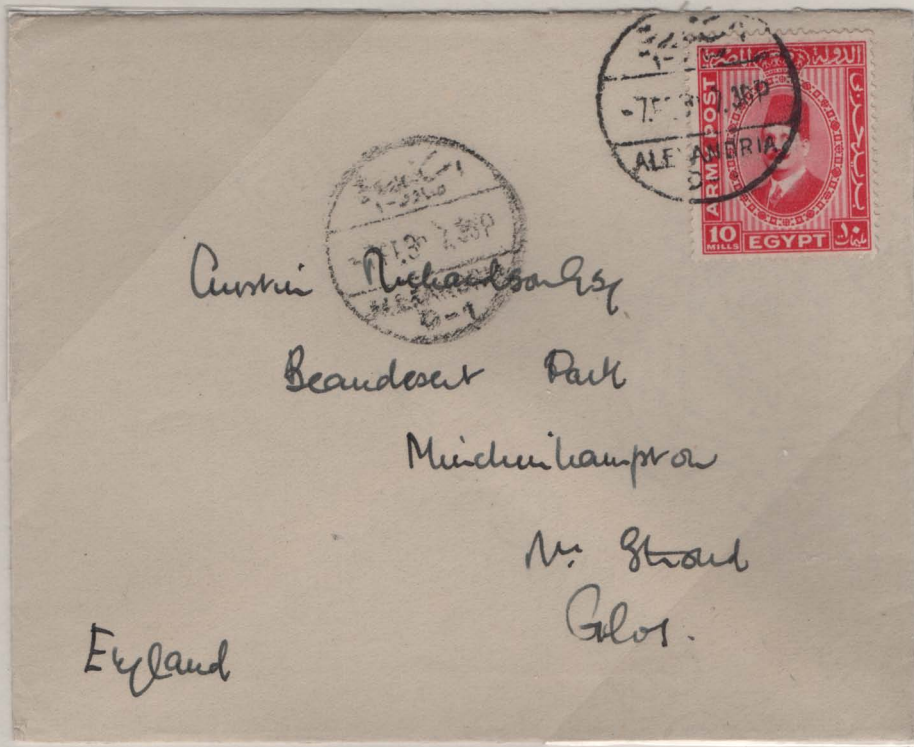
1. Letters must be posted in military post boxes.

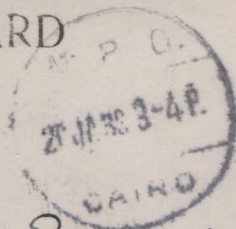

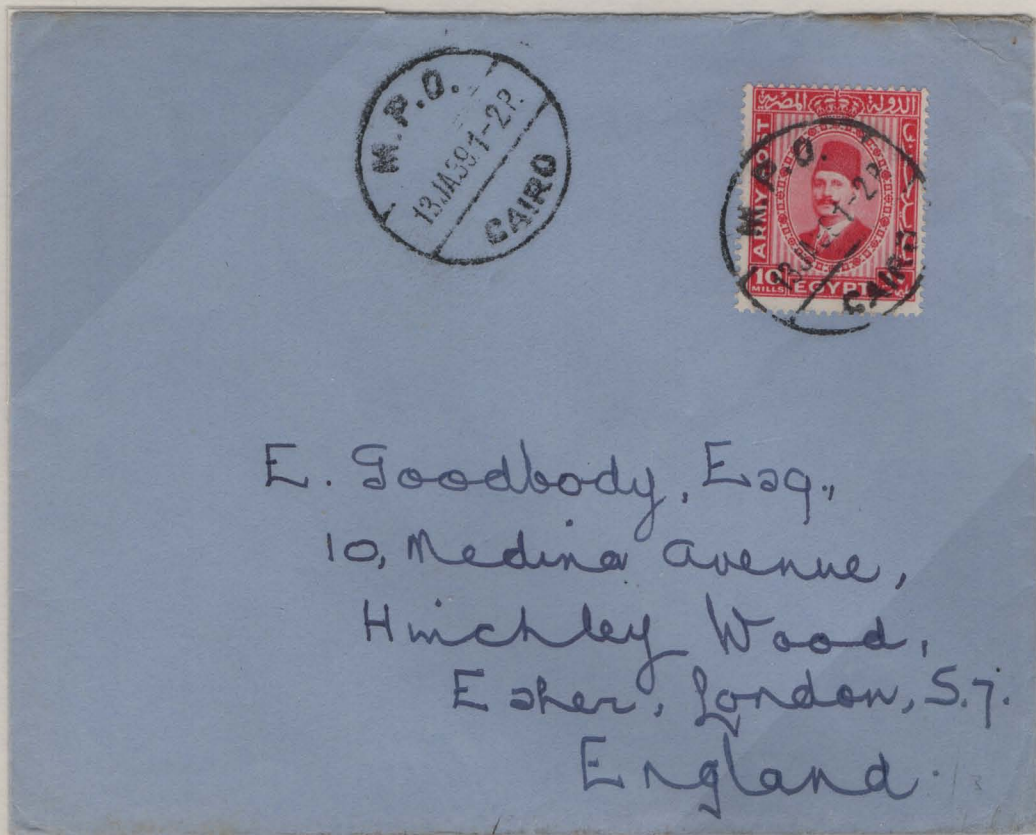

Double Rate Letter Incorrectly Charged Postage Due



Properly franked, cancelled, and addressed to England, all correct within the terms of the military postal concession. Incorrectly charged postage due, however, within England.



Double Rate Letter Correctly Charged Postage Due



Correctly franked and cancelled within terms of concession.  
However, addressed to the U. S., a destination excluded from  
terms of the concession.
