During this period, four major Postal Concessions were negotiated for British military personnel in Egypt:



- 1) Concession of November 1, 1932, -- one piaster (versus 1 1/2 piaster civil rate) British military letter rate to England, Scotland, and Irish Free State;
- Concession of November 26, 1932, special rate for Christmas cards from British military personnel;
- 3) Concession of March 1, 1936, special Egyptianissued Army Post stamps and procedure regularization.
- 4) Concession of October 28, 1939, 40 millieme (versus 60 millieme civil rate) military air mail rate.

This exhibit, which is based on these concessions and the adhesives issued to indicate actual payment of the rates concerned, is arranged thusly:



Numeral franks normally struck in red; black and violet less common. Number 7, lost March 1932, is the most uncommon.






















