Defensively he's great.



1954 was only Hank's third season in organized baseball, and his first in the majors. It was also the first year he played the outfield. He got into 122 games for the Braves and batted .280. He had 131 hits good for a total of 209 bases. These included 27 doubles, 6 triples and 13 homers. He batted in 69 runs and scored 58 In 1953 with Jacksonville of the Sally League, Hank led the league in runs, hits, doubles, runs batted in, batting, put-outs and assists. ©В.G.H.L.I. Willie is the greatest, so say many experts. The National League's Most Valuable Player, Willie won the batting title on the last day of the season with a .345 mark. In his first full season in the majors, he also led in triples with 13. He appeared in 151 games and had 195 hits. Besides the triples he had 33 doubles and 41 homers, and he batted in 110 runs, scoring 119. His catches in the outfield have become a legend, and he has a throwing arm with which runners take no chances.

Mickey batted an even .300 in his third major league season. He's a slugger to be reckoned with. Appearing in 146 games for New York in 1954, he led the league in runs scored with 129. His 163 hits were for a total of 285 bases, and included 17 doubles, 12 triples and 27 homers. He batted in 102 runs. As is often the case with sluggers, Mickey also led the league in strikeouts with 107. He is a highly regarded young player. Started in organized hall in 1949.
